NOTES ON THE SPECIAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING February 16, 2022

The last meeting of SEAC on January 24 was the first of a two-part exercise in drafting recommendations to the Resource Allocation Committee (RAC), which makes yearly recommendations about the allocation of revenues. The Education Act requires the RAC to engage in an annual consultation exercise before making its recommendations, and SEAC is a part of that process.

The main focus of the meeting last month was to hear a financial report related to the organization of services for students with special needs presented jointly by Lisa Falasconi, Director of Complementary Services and the new Director of the Finance Department, Martine Lupien. Following on the presentation of last year, SEAC had asked for a more detailed report on the outcomes of our previous recommendations, which included among other things more training for staff on topics related to special needs students, as well as increased investments and attention to necessary adaptations of services to students with special needs in the online environment related to covid. We essentially asked for a line of sight on what had been accomplished with regard to those goals before making additional ones this year. The primary objective of this annual presentation is to give SEAC a broad brushstroke understanding of the financial parameters and constraints affecting the provision of support services to students with special needs. The highlights of the report as always are to explain the following:

• The basic principle of funding is that support to students equals staffing, i.e., resource and classroom teachers, support staff and professionals.

- The Ministry provides what is referred to as base and additional funding for staffing.
- Base funding for staffing is calculated on enrollment and student population data.
- Additional funding for staffing is funded by grants that address specific needs and are directed for specific use.

With regard to our specific questions about the impact or outcome of our recommendations on the allocation of resources, the Directors made clear that they were not able to provide many answers. In effect, the Director of Finance conducts a high-level accounting exercise to make sure funds are spent generally as intended by the Ministry of Education. Thus, she stated that she did not have specific information about how money allocated was spent, for instance on how many hours of training on a specific topic for what number of staff members. In fact, these decisions and the accountability for them rests with individual schools. This means that for all intents and purposes, the kinds of specific recommendations that SEAC has been making are not directed at the right table; and in fact, the RAC itself does not have the power to determine how dollars are specifically spent in schools, but rather articulates a broad vision and principles that it suggests that schools adopt. We also learned that due to contractual agreements with teachers and staff, which are negotiated with the provincial government, there are tables within schools at which parents have no line of sight or voice that make decisions about things like priorities and funding for training.

The only possible avenue of influence or accountability is, therefore, here at Governing Boards which approve and receive reports on the school budget. Thus, it is incumbent on parents at this table to be equipped and intentional about asking in depth questions and making specific recommendations before voting about how and where money is being spent to address students' educational needs. Your inquiries have the most consequential impact and influence. The next SEAC meeting, at which RAC recommendations for the 2022-23 school year will be drafted, is planned for February 23. While this exercise will be more philosophical in nature, I will make a point of bringing to Governing Board next month and in subsequent months the practical questions and concerns that SEAC discerns are relevant with regard to meeting the specific needs of our exceptional students.
