#### NOTES ON THE SPECIAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEETING March 9, 2022

Since the last Hadley/PWHS Governing Board meeting, SEAC has met three times, including Monday and Tuesday of this week, in order draft responses to the ten questions posed to us by the Resource Allocation Committee (RAC). The RAC makes yearly recommendations to Council about the allocation of resources. As I mentioned at your previous meeting, the Education Act requires the RAC to engage in an annual consultation exercise before making its recommendations, and SEAC is a part of that process.

You will recall that with regard to SEAC's specific questions in January about the impact or outcome of any of our previous recommendations on the allocation of resources, the Finance Director and Complementary Services Director stated clearly that they were not able to provide many answers. In the meantime, we continued to gather information about student statistics and allocations of funds to schools, notably the Complementary Services Parity Committee minutes from last November tabled at Council. All that to say, the reality of operating in an environment where there is low functional accountability for the expenditure of millions of dollars for special needs students shaped SEAC's focus as we drafted recommendations this year.

#### The first question asked us:

1. Do you have any recommendations related to the *objectives and principles* used to govern the allocation of funds (specifically as they pertain to equitable delivery for students with special needs)?

Our answer emphasized the importance of transparent, data-driven, evidence-based decision making that should undergird the expenditure of taxpayers' dollars. Ensuring equitable delivery of services across the WQSB is dependent on a clear accounting of how and where funds are being spent, analysis of educational service impacts, trends in terms of progress on measurable goals, etc. To that end we recommended among other things that investments be made in creating a systemic management tool to track the effect of any recommendations that were chosen to be implemented.

We also observed that school-based control of funding often means that there is no consistency for students who may struggle with the same difficulties in different schools but do not always have access to effective support. We believe that families with limited means should not be expected to pick up the financial burden of securing private assessments, support and services; and most importantly, socio-economic status should not be an insurmountable obstacle to students with special needs accessing the resources they need to reach their full individual potential in the educational setting.

We recommended a variety of what we think are innovative solutions, including developing mechanisms that leverage online resources to gather and support isolated, underserved students when category of need permits, thus permitting support staff, professionals and educators from across the Board to reach those students, encouraging the Board to join with other school boards to engage the Ministry of Education around the pressing issue of reducing waiting lists for assessments in English by accepting licensed professional services from outside the province or subsidizing travel to say Montreal to get assessments done.

We have continued to advocate for increasing training for support staff and teachers who work with special needs students but understanding that these are for the most part school-based decisions, I will at the next meeting offer suggestions to the GBs to follow up on with regard to specific training concerns, like around Human Rights. Also, SEAC perceives a need for more training of all students so that understanding and sensitivity towards special needs students is improved.

The next SEAC meeting is planned for March 28.
